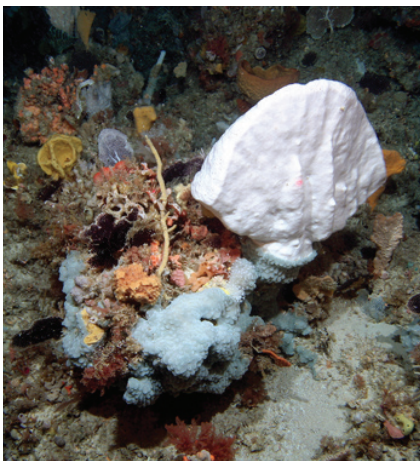
Students are invited to present research proposals, initial findings or final outcomes relating to the Ningaloo Marine Park and surrounding region at our Student Research Day.

Ningaloo research
